

Gordon Ryder Memorial Seat

On Sunday June 17th, after the 10am Family Service at St Nicholas Church, Warwick, the vicar, Reverend Roger Garratt, blessed a new seat in memory of the late Lion Gordon Ryder in the presence of his widow Betty, Lions & friends.

Gordon, who died in Warwick Hospital in August 2004, was the last remaining founder member of Warwick Lions Club.

He was born in Worcester and met Betty at the Rowing Club there. They married in 1939 and during the war went all over the country, Gordon constructing new airfields whilst Betty worked as a land girl.

After the war, he became an Assistant City engineer first at Hereford then at Stoke-on-Trent where he took up golf.

He moved to Warwick District Council as Deputy to Kenilworth Town Engineer, a job he held until he retired. He joined Kenilworth Golf Club. In due course became Captain of the Elderly Gents Group commonly known as the EGGs.

In October 1960, he became a Charter Member of Warwick Lions Club, becoming President in 1966 and later Vice District Governor.

He held every post in the club and is perhaps best remembered as Welfare Chairman, a post he held for many years.

Grants Awarded at June Board Meeting

More than US\$2.4 million in grants were approved at the June 2007 LCIF Board Meeting. Lions Clubs from all over the world were granted funds to assist many humanitarian projects, such as partnering with Lions in Malaysia for a clean water project (Korea), equipping a rehabilitation center for the disabled (Italy), upgrading the kitchen and dining room at an Easter Seals camp (Canada) and constructing a clinic and vocational center for the disabled (Honduras). - 1) I recently sent out a "CONNECT" News Sheet updating all continuing/incoming Club Secretaries on the change to Electronic Reporting, etc, but I would like it to be in Midland News as well so that all Members can be more directly aware what is going on.
- 2) The great majority of Clubs have already accepted the dynamic change to Electronic Reporting and only a handful have yet to, "bite the bullet" so a 100% situation should be achievable over the next few months.
- 3) The support and guidance from LCI Oak Brook has been very good, which is just as well, because the Multiple District has from the outset been strangely silent on this whole subject.
