Solihull Lions add a Nine to 999

On Tuesday evening, the safest place to be in Solihull could have been the Mayor's Parlour as FastAid Community First Responders (CFRs) received nine new defibrillators donated by the Lions Club of Solihull.

Handing over the £10,000 gift, the Mayor of Solihull, Councillor Glenis Slater praised both the Lions Club and the role of the CFRs saying how important the contribution of voluntary groups is within the Borough "These two organisations both do tremendous good for the community and thanks to Solihull Lions our local FastAid volunteers can continue

with their wonderful life saving work"

Richard Jay, Chairman of FastAid and a CFR himself explained "FastAid was formed in Solihull 10 years ago and some of our defibrillators date from then. We decided to launch an appeal to enable us to get right up to date with the latest models and also to upgrade to ECG monitors; this incredible donation has taken us a long way towards that goal. They will be issued to the ten CFRs within central Solihull and we will now, for the first time, have an ECG monitor based in our scheme car. This will make such a difference to patient care. We are extremely grateful to the members of Solihull Lions Club for their generosity."

Paul Jolly, President of Solihull Lions continued "The motto of Lions International is 'We serve' and we recognised immediately that is something we have in common with the volunteers from FastAid. When we heard of their immediate need for replacement defibrillators, it seemed such a worthwhile charity for us to support. It is good to know that the CFRs within Solihull now have the best equipment and we are delighted to have played our part in that".

Also lending a hand was Julian Knight, MP for Solihull who added "One of the defibrillators donated by Solihull Lions, in its first day of use, has contributed to a resuscitation in our town showing how valuable it is to have a fully equipped and a fast response when someone suffers a cardiac arrest"

Andy Jeynes, Community Response Manager from West Midlands Ambulance said of FastAid CFRs "Community First Responders are a great asset to West Midlands Ambulance Service and to the community they serve. Because they are local they can be on scene very quickly and this can make a real difference. Probably, when combined with their skills, the most important single piece of kit they carry is the defibrillator. In a cardiac arrest it really is the only equipment capable of restoring an output from the heart. West Midlands Ambulance and the whole community are very grateful to Solihull Lions for providing such fantastic support".

Heart of England students are again using their artistic flair to create a masterpiece for the Balsall Common Lion's annual firework and bonfire celebrations. The Year 12 Art students are hard at work painting a huge, five panel mural which will provide a decorative frontispiece for the magnificent bonfire. Painted onto hardboard panels, fixed to a wooden frame the impressive piece is a talking point for visitors, especially when the fire gets going! Based on the Disney/Pixar film *Inside Out,* the artwork depicts the emotions of joy, sadness, fear, anger, and disgust. The story focuses on the neuropsychological theory that human emotions are mirrored in

relationships and can be significantly moderated by them.

The students have taken over one studio to paint the panels and are very focussed on finishing. Asked about how they felt about their art going up in smoke one student joked, "I trying not to think about it!" The mural is set to be finished by the end of the week in preparation for installation by the Lion's. "How long will it take? It will take too long for it to be set on fire." said another student.

Autumn Forum

Sunday 18/10 about 80 Lions met at the St. Johns Hotel in Solihull. A most interesting program was presented that was worked through on a tight schedule.

After the welcome by lan Haffner, last year's DG, we were welcomed by our current DG, Heather Jeavons. It was followed by a presentation about Food Hygiene rules by Lion Ray Stephens. Summarising, when food and/or drink is part of an activity, all allergens have to be known of the foods/drinks involved, so people can be informed in case they have an allergy. In the kitchen were food is prepared has to be a sink for washing hands and the building were food is served needs to have a bathroom. Ideally, these rules are also to be kept for Lions activities which do not include the public. When using outside caterers, we are still responsible and need to check if the foods supplied are according the rules. Ideally there should be someone in charge who has a Level 2 Food Hygiene Certificate. Perhaps someone has that in the club, if not, someone can easily get such a certificate. The course is online. Lions has a code which gives a discount on the examination fee. Ask Ray for the code (hso@lions105m.org.uk).

David Blakeman, secretary of Balsall Common Lions, gave an overview of the use of MyLCI, the online tool secretaries need to use for recording the club's activities etc. This seems to frighten some clubs, but David claims he did not start to use a computer till he joined Lions, but the way he talked, the use of this program is a walk in the park and lightens the load of the secretary. DG Heather, who is also secretary of her club, agreed with that. On top of that, proper filling in of the data, gives her a valuable tool in checking how the District is doing.

Martin Hill talked about the new set up of the charity structure of Lions Clubs in MD105. It is called CIO, meaning Charitable incorporated organisation. This means that the club as a whole can be a charity, rather than a part. It is a change and like all change, it might be difficult to understand exactly the ins and outs straight away, but it is an improvement and more money will be available for our work.

Joy Haffner gave a short summary of her charity project of last year, which actually continues. She raised £17,000 and received also \$3,000 from Past Int. Pres. Joe Preston. He visited SIFA Fireside and was very impressed. Joy is now organising Lions branded backpacks with contents. The current DG Partner appeal is at the B'ham Children where we raise funds to make the room were a big MRI scanner is, more child friendly. This is done by electronic wizardry, were children can design the room colours, play music, watch

movies, all dictated by a tablet computer they can hold. It will make the children more relaxed and results in better scans, less scans and other positive results that make the affair not only better for the child, but also make the room more productive. Talk about Win, Win.

Main lessons are: Try to get a direct name from a local correspondent and direct emails to him directly. Repeat emails if you do not get an answer. Straight the reason for your email in the first line, explain afterwards what you are. He also did some test interviews with a few members of the public. This was followed by a great presentation from the team that prepares the March District Convention. I can only say, book now before the rooms run out. It is going to be a great event. Water Projects Update

<u>1. Water Project 2014-15 extended Project – Supply of Piped Water and Greenhouses in Bungoma</u> <u>County, Kenya. Cost £5,000</u>

Bungoma County has a population of almost 1.4 million, with an economy mainly based on agriculture, coupled with rural unemployment and where 52.9% live in poverty.

In late November 2014 Cabinet approved a new District 105M Water Project project, consisting off piped water from Webuye Milo reservoir and new build of green houses for widows and orphans to grow crops to sell at market.

Although this is strictly not a water project alone, it cannot operate without a constant supply of piped water, which forms a large part of the cost.

The Lion's Club of Kakameja will manage this project which will be overseen by Club member PCC Rajinder Sembi, who is also a GMT leader for District MD411. This club will be able to construct and oversee the management of green house farming, identify viable crops for widows and orphans to plant, cultivate and sell at market. The project is self sustaining

It provides three main purposes for widows and orphans:-

- work and a regular source of income.
- □ A means of supporting education
- guarantees supply of water for irrigation and home consumption.

During the first year of this Project, 25 Clubs donated £2,500 and with your help I hope to complete this valued Project early in 2016.

2. Water Project 2013 -14, Provision of Water Pumps, £1,000 per Pump, Terai Region, Nepal.

Thanks to the amazing support of individuals and Clubs this Project ,which was interrupted by the devastating earthquake last year, is nearing completion.

More than £10,000 was raised which enabled 10 pumps to be installed in 10 remote villages. Four pumps were completed before the earthquake and the six remaining pumps are in the final stage of completion. All of the pumps will have plaques dedicated to the donors and these are currently being produced and installed.

I am awaiting a power point presentation of the whole Project which I will circulate when received.

The photos below will give you an idea of their worth and the hardship of people who do not have a water supply in their home.

An award will be presented to the winning photographers. The six (the five category winners and the Best of Show) winning photos will appear on the Lions Web site.

of the public. Richard Brown, unit manager for the Droitwich adult branch, said: "It's somewhere for people to be treated with a bit of privacy and dignity. We have already used it. I think this is a fantastic initiative to raise money for local charities "

Droitwich Challengers, which is a club for adults with learning disabilities, has received help from the Lions before – to fund a trip to the Snoezelen Centre in Worcester, but their grant of £250 is helping to fund a trip further afield to Monkey Forest near Stoke on Trent. Eunice Williams from Challengers said: "The money will pay for half the coach, or for our entrance, it helps us to do a fair bit more. We do raise money and we could be self-sufficient, but we wouldn't do these big trips, and all the clients love coming."


