A Corby and District Lion's spokesman said, 'We were approached by lan for help in renovating a 40 sq m plot of derelict land adjacent to their scout hut. They wanted to use the land to expand their outdoor activities which are an important feature of Scouting, e.g fire lighting, cooking and pioneering.' As a voluntary group they receive no outside funding - whatever they need they have to fund raise for first.

The £500 grant they were given, combined with the proceeds of bag packing at a local supermarket will allow them to purchase materials to do the job themselves. What impressed us was that they have parents with the necessary skills and qualifications to complete the work at no charge to the group.'

**Lions Celebrate Challenging Year** Knowle and Dorridge Lions Club celebrated a challenging year last month when the club held its annual presentation evening at the Greswolde Hotel in Knowle.

Welcoming supporters and sponsors Deputy Richard Buckley announced that the club had raised over £69,000 for charity over the past 12 months, primarily through its Knowle Fun Run, Festive Walk and Heart of England Bike Ride. He thanked all the sponsors saying 'It's great for our club of only 20 Lions to celebrate such success again, but without the help from companies like yourselves our events would never realise so much for charity.' He emphasised how his Club needed more active Lions if it is going to sustain this tremendous fundraising and community support programme in future years.

"The Lions year started last December with its 25<sup>th</sup> Festive Walk from Baddesley Clinton House where heavy rain the night before on top of already water logged fields meant that we had to curtail the walks we were offering. The weather certainly did not affect some walker's enthusiasm with nearly 800 generously donating over £3,800 for Breast Cancer Haven & Headway our two partner charities, as well as local causes too."

Richard then illustrated some of the Lions projects the club has embraced including Lions International Foundation, Hikkaduwa Flood Appeal in Sri Lanka, Lions Sight Savers Trust, Message in a Bottle, Great Spec Collect where over 1,000 pairs had been donated in just over a month for recycling in Ghana, Nigeria & Nepal. Chris Kiddle Morris, Chair of the clubs Community Services Committee, explained the aims of the club's Youth Travel Bursary and introduced a presentation prepared by last year's winner Kristian Bennett of his time with the Flavela brass band Project in Rio Janeiro.

Chris Kiddle-Morris explained that the Club retained 50% of raised funds to be spent on locally determined causes. During the year his committee had spent over £18,000 on a variety of local and not so local projects as well as those for youth and elderly. These included donations to the local Fast Aid Group, 4<sup>th</sup> Knowle Sea Scouts, Dorridge Primary school, the refurbishment of Chadwick End Village Hall kitchen, MyAware, Meningitis Now, refurbishment of Knowle Knot Garden and memorial benches in both Knowle and Dorridge. Richard then presented cheques totalling £22,297 the 2

partner charities Breast Cancer Haven & Headway (Birmingham & Solihull), who in turn thanked the Lions for their fantastic fundraising

North Sea Lions Annual Board meeting meets in Leeuwarden, Netherlands

For the  $38^{th}$  time the board members of the 11 Districts making up North Sea Lions (NSL) met up to decide which project would receive the annual grant of apx.  $\in 62,000$ .

11 Districts from UK, Netherlands, Germany and Denmark make up NSL. 105E and 105M are the UK districts taking part in NSL. All clubs in these 11 districts donate  $\in$ 80 and the total of this adds up to apx.  $\in$ 62,000. Clubs in these districts can submit projects which have to be in the developing world and East Europe. This year we had a bumper crop with 4 projects submitted, one from each country. From the UK we had a project from Rothwell and Desborough LC who planned to build a secondary school in Uganda. The 2 members that made the trip to NL gave a good presentation, but this time the board choose a project in Tanzania, submitted by a Dutch club. The project is a solar power plant that supplies a hospital with energy.

Next year the meeting will be in Bremen, Germany. As 105 is into redistricting, 105 E and M will have to say farewell to NSL. But the 2 officers see it as their task to motivate the new districts to join NSL again. The opportunities it creates are enormous. NSL assists in real big projects that clubs on their own would find difficult to fund.

A Lion spokesman explained, 'Lions clubs around the world try to support World Sight Day, which was on the 13th october this year. We are seeking to raise awareness of the importance of getting eyes checked regularly in order to prevent sight threatening conditions. At the same time, we are raising money to support 'Eye Camps' in developing countries, eg treating people with cataracts, glaucoma and treating the infections that can cause River Blindness. We are also grateful to Margaret Lithall from National Association for the Blind for attending and displaying various products which can assist the partially sighted and blind in their own homes.'

This was so he could appreciate some of the difficulties himself whilst trying to find and buy an item in a shop and purchase a cup of coffee.
